Fancy Fair for Tower and Spire.—Four years ago we were busily engaged in preparation for the Jubilee Day, and the result was the inauguration of a great work, the laying of the foundation stone of the Victoria Tower and Spire of our Church. Our friends and neighbours were surprised at the energy which was then displayed, and the liberality which opened the purses of one and all. Nearly £1400 was raised within four months, and everything was prepared for that auspicious day, June 20th, 1887, when we commenced the building of one of the handsomest and most fitting memorials of Her Majesty's reign of 50 years completed. Time, however, always swift of wing, has not stopped still, and already four years have nearly passed, and our

work is not yet completely paid for. There is still a sum of £360 to be raised; nearly £100 is promised, but £260 more must be found before the work which we took in hand can be pronounced to be finished. The good people of Hampton Hill are now invited to make one grand effort to accomplish this object, and we would cordially ask each and every one of them to do their part to make this effort a success. A Grand Fancy Fair will be held (D.V.) in the Vicarage Grounds, on Tuesday and Wednesday, June 30th, and July 1st, under the most distinguished patronage of H.R.H. Princess Frederica of Hanover, and H.R.H. Princess Mary Adelaide, Duchess of Teck, and also a number of ladies from far and near, who have promised their aid most readily. We have every hope that we shall succeed, but our success will be measured by the energy which the people of Hampton Hill display in working for, and contributing to the various stalls. All sorts of goods are asked for, and they should be sent in on or before June 20th. Presents of fruit and flowers and all requisites for the refreshment tent will be most acceptable on the day of the Fair. Once more let us ask all to rouse themselves and set to work to do all they can to help.

Home Industry Exhibition.—In our anxiety to make the fancy fair a success, we must not forget that our second Home Industry Exhibition is arranged to be held in the girl's school, on the Wednesday in Whitsun week, May 20th. Notice of exhibits should be sent to Mrs. FitzWygram, or to Miss Barnard, on or before Saturday May 9th. The entrance fee is 2d. for each exhibit. It is probably fresh to the memory of most of us how successful our first exhibition, hastily got up for the horticultural show, proved to be. Our Royal visitor, H.R.H. Princess Frederica, was especially interested in the Home Industry tent, and expressed her great satisfaction. Let us hope that our second venture will be no less successful, and that there will be a good number of those who come to see the show.

Easter Services.—One special feature of our Easter services was the largeness of the congregations, and the number of communicants. Especially pleasing are these proofs of the deeper hidden spiritual work, and very grateful ought we to be to God for these tokens of the blessing which He has given on His work amongst us. The decorations, notwithstanding the shortness of the supply of flowers, were very effective and showed much taste. The singing as hearty and earnest as ever. There were upwards of forty in the choir at the evening service.

Easter Vestry.—The Annual Vestry took place as usual on Thursday, April 2nd, and it was attended by a goodly number of parishioners. The accounts still show a considerable want of funds, especially as further outlay on the heating apparatus is absolutely necessary. Mr. W. C. B. Hall again consented to be Vicar's Churchwarden, and Mr. A. E. Storey was unanimously re-elected to act for the parish. The sidesmen of last year were re-elected, and Mr. Arthur Bowling and Mr. Embleton were elected to the places of those whose loss during the past year we have all so greatly deplored—Mr. Thomas Bowling and Mr. James Singleton.
