MY DEAR PEOPLE,

There is no event in the Parish more important, or upon which more depends, than the annual Confirmation. This year it will take place in our Church, on Monday, June 20th, at 8 p.m. The Bishop has written a letter, which I shall read in Church on April 10th, pointing out the tremendous issues which are at stake at such a time, and the need there is for great and careful preparation. When I have received the names of those who desire to become candidates I will announce the dates and hours of the classes. There will be, I believe, some *adult* candidates, and I shall very gladly make special arrangements for their preparation.

Those of you, and there are many, who work for the Missions of the Church "Overseas," will be glad and encouraged to see Mr. Gaster's letter which reached me on March 21st. The result is excellent.

I call your very serious attention to the "Quota" for Diocesan purposes which we are called upon to raise. The Budget is drawn up for the whole diocese, and then the amount is allocated first to the Deaneries and then to the Parishes. Hampton Deanery is asked to raise £1,060, and our Parish £62. The money is expended on Church Buildings, Poor Clergy, Clergy Pensions, Clergy Widows, Day and Sunday Schools, and Welfare of Lads, &c. Towards this £62, the "Free-Will" offerings are devoted. Mr. Elliott acts as Treasurer, and contributions should be sent to him. I am very anxious that our support for "Home" Missions shall be at least equal to that for Missions "overseas."

When Lady-Day falls on Good Friday, the Mothers' Union Services are usually deferred. This happens this year, and there will be celebrations at 8, 10 and 12, on Tuesday, April 5th, the times have been arranged to suit everyone.

The quarterly service will be held on Wednesday, April 13th, at 3.30 p.m.

I am sorry that I was unable to preach the course of sermons that I had intended in Lent, but I hope to preach on Sunday mornings from April 10th to May 8th, on the "Beatitudes."

I shall be away from the Parish from April 1st to 9th, and shall be glad to be spared correspondence as far as possible.

I read recently of three parishes which raised £250 by a similar stall! Also orders may be given to me for jam, jelly and chutney to be made later in the season, but as there will be only a limited supply, it will be well to give orders in good time. In regard to the Working Party, the Committee will be glad if orders for garments, etc., are given either to Mrs. Stevens or myself, or Miss Brewer.

May I suggest also that the Resolution may be inserted in your Parish Magazine? The knowledge that the Fund is now grappling in a determined manner with this problem, will help in raising the full parochial quota. Assuring you of our desire to co-operate with you.

"That the Council of the London Diocesan Fund being convinced that the most pressing need of the Diocese at the moment is the provision of adequate remuneration of the Clergy, calls upon all parishes to put this before all other claims, and in order to stimulate local and individual effort, undertakes to set aside this year a sum not exceeding £20,000, to supplement sums raised locally, or by way of contribution to the Office List, and trusts that Church people generally throughout the Diocese will realize the duty of making a strenuous effort to secure for every Incumbent a minimum stipend of £400, in addition to a house and rates, or an allowance in lieu of a house. It is estimated that the sum required will not be less than £35,000 per annum."
