MY DEAR PEOPLE,

At the meeting of the Church Parochial Council held on Tuesday, June 21st, it was decided, on my suggestion, that at an early date arrangements would be made for a daily Celebration of the Holy Communion. I very much hope, in course of time, to evolve a plan by which every branch of Church work will have its day of special intercession, on which someone connected with that work will be present. The hour suggested is 7.30 a.m., thus enabling those to attend whose occupation takes them to London or elsewhere. Doubtless others who have particular days in their Calendar of joy or sorrow will be glad of these opportunities of worship. The services will last about half-an-hour, and will begin on Thursday, September 1st. The other week-day services will be continued as at present.

The newly-confirmed will make their First Communion on Sunday, July 10th, at 8 a.m., their names appear elsewhere. I trust parents and God-parents will endeavour to be present on that occasion.

A well attended meeting was held in the Church Room, on Thursday, June 28th, when it was decided to organize a Garden Fête and Café Chantant in the Vicarage grounds, on July 27th. Strong and representative Committees were chosen, the proceedings will begin at 3 and conclude at 10.30 p.m. I shall be glad if those who wish to lend a hand will communicate with the various Secretaries. *Entertainments*: Mr. Faraker, Park Road; *Refreshments*: Mrs. Carpenter, St. James's Road; *Sports*: Mr. A. Nightingale, Myrtle Road. Dancing will take place in the evening under the superintendence of Messrs. Carpenter, Hallt, Nightingale and Wintle. We hope to raise £100 for various parochial needs, such as Day Schools,

for which £30 will be required in September. The general Secretary and Treasurer is Mr. R. A. Elliott, Thirlestane, Uxbridge Road.

Special Sermons will be preached and collections made on July 10th, with the object of assisting the Diocese to raise £20,000, which it needs over and above the ordinary income in order to fulfil the pledge given to increase the stipends of the clergy; I hope to secure a prominent Lay-man to preach at 11 a.m. on that day.

The Sunday Schools are much in need of financial help, the collections on July 31st will be devoted to that object.

"The British Empire."

"It has been the common fate of Empires, when they have reached the summit of their power, to totter and fall, because of their vastness. For instance, there are Italy, Spain and Greece, all of these have been great Empires, but have fallen. But the British Empire will never fall as long as her people remain firm and true, so huge are her dominions. We first started colonizing in the reign of Queen Elizabeth, and kept on right up to the reign of Queen Victoria. Everybody is proud of his country, like the poet Scott said,

"Breathes there a man with soul so dead,
Who never to himself hath said,
This is my own, my native land."

If a man does not love his country, he is not worthy of a British name. The price of our Empire was not of money, but the life and blood of our forefathers. Wherever our flag (the Union Jack) flies there is Liberty, Peace and Justice. Our duty towards the Empire is to keep that which has been gained for us. Our colonies supply us with food, as well as being markets to sell our goods in, and coaling and naval stations. From Canada, Australia and New Zealand, troops came to the mother country's aid, and we have to thank them for the service they rendered in the last great War. Not one of our colonies would turn away from England, for their people are allowed to live freely."
