MY DEAR FRIENDS,

The response to the appeal we made for the RE-BUILDING OF THE ORGAN will be found below, and so far it is extremely gratifying. The order has been given for the work to be done, and it will be completed in the Autumn. I hope in time for the Harvest Thanksgiving. An account of the Organ as it will be is printed below. More than half the money required has now been promised, and I hope that those who have not yet given their names as contributors will kindly do so as early as convenient. If we can raise the money without a Sale of Work, it will be a great saving of time and money, and will in every way be much more satisfactory. A box will be fixed in the Church for contributions, and I hope that some will give a weekly sum, however small. We shall also adopt other ways of raising money, by collecting cards, &c. A well known musical friend has kindly promised to give a lecture in the Boys' School on the "Life and Works of Mozart," with musical illustrations, on Tuesday, April 30th, for the Fund. I hope we may have a large audience.

At a meeting held at the Schools on the 12th ult., to protest against the proposed Disestablishment and Disendowment of the Church in Wales, a strong resolution was passed unanimously, and a copy was sent to the member for the Uxbridge Division, the Hon. Charles Mills, M.P., who has replied as follows:—"I am much obliged to you for your letter of the 12th inst., enclosing a resolution protesting against the Disestablishment of the Church in Wales, passed recently at Hampton Hill Schools. As you say in your letter, you may most certainly count upon my "strong and determined opposition at every stage when the Bill is before the House." A great meeting was held in Twickenham Town Hall on the 29th ult., when speeches against Disestablishment were made by S. J. G. Hoare, Esq., M.P., Mr. Ingram, Mr. Richard Davies and Dr. Mosse. The usual resolution was passed unanimously.

On GOOD FRIDAY there will be service in the morning at 11, and Meditations on the Saviour's "Last Words" from 2 to 3 p.m. In the evening at 8 p.m. Stainer's "Crucifixion" will be given by the Choir. The collections throughout the day will be for the local Society for Rescue and Preventive Work. I hope we may have large Congregations.

On EASTER DAY there will be celebrations of the Holy Communion at 6, 7, 8 a.m., and mid-day. I would remind you that this is one of the three days in the year when we all are specially invited to come to the Holy Communion. The newly Confirmed will then come for the first time, and I hope their parents and friends will come with them. It is also just the time for those who have been

neglectful to make a new start. Will all who come very kindly as usual put their names and addresses in the basket in the Church porch?

THE PARISH CHURCH ORGAN.

"Praise Him with stringed instruments and organs."

The work of re-building our organ has been entrusted to Messrs. Hele and Co., of Plymouth and London, which firm has re-built the organs in Winchester, Chichester and Cork Cathedrals, in such well known Churches as S. James's, Paddington, S. Peter Mancroft, Norwich, and Plymouth Parish Church.

The whole of the pipes in our organ will be used again in the re-built instrument, and its characteristic mellow tone should be greatly enhanced when the accumulated dust is cleared out of the pipes and some of them re-voiced.

The latest form of tubular pneumatic action will be fitted throughout. The "touch" will be as light and flexible as that of the finest pianoforte. The fingers will merely have to move the key or stop, and the compressed air will do the rest. All cumbersome and noisy mechanism will be entirely absent.

Two new stops will be added to the pedal organ; a sub-octave and a super-octave coupler will be provided for the swell organ, thereby doubling its power and resources. The swell shutters will be made to open vertically, thus sending the tone straight down the Church. The case work will be entirely remodelled to allow of the tone to have free access to the body of the Church so far as possible.

The organ will be blown by a "Sterling" fan, driven by an electric motor revolving 1,300 times per minute, and the wind pressures will be 6 inches for the action and 3½ inches for the pipe-work.
