MY DEAR FRIENDS,

I call your attention to a very important announcement concerning the proposed Parish Hall which appears elsewhere. There can be little doubt of the necessity for such a building, in which large numbers of Parishioners will be able to meet for religious and social purposes. Great care will be taken to secure the property to the Church, and I hope that when a meeting is called, possibly in September, to consider the matter, we shall have the hearty support of all Church people.

For some years past a very useful and sadly necessary work has been carried on in this neighbourhood by the S. Catherine's Home for friendless and other girls. Like nearly all similar institutions it is unable to advertise its operations, but I very gladly call attention to it. It is hoped that every parish in the Deanery will take its share in finding the necessary funds. Subscriptions may be sent to Mrs. Powell, 5, Park Road, while Mrs. Percy Hunter has undertaken to collect in Park Road, St. James' Avenue and Uxbridge Road; other collectors are needed.

May I appeal to the Parishioners for help in the Sunday Schools? There is still a lack of Teachers, and classes have had to be joined together in consequence. There must be some who can give an hour on Sunday morning or afternoon to this very essential part of our Church work, and I shall be really grateful to hear from any such.

In spite of a very wet afternoon, the sum of £16 8s. 8d. was realized at the Mission Sale of Work held in the Vicarage garden, on Wednesday, July 15th. It is hoped to have a further sale, probably in October, when the remainder of the articles, and there are a good many, will be sold.

Our Branch of the C.E.T.S. carried on in this parish finished its Session by an open-air Meeting and Concert, on Tuesday, July 14th. Miss Bridgman gave a very inspiring address, and Mr. Jordan, the Secretary, read an encouraging report of the past year's work.

During August the week-day Services will be Litany Wednesdays and Fridays at 11; and Holy Communion on Thursdays at 11.
